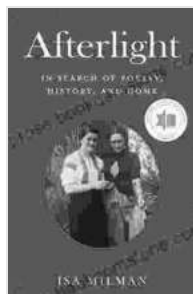

Epilogue: Returning Home



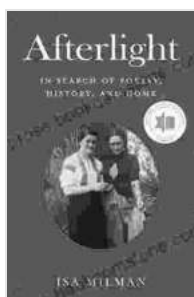
As my journey came to an end, I returned home a changed person. I had seen the world in a new light, and I had a deeper understanding of myself and my place in it.
