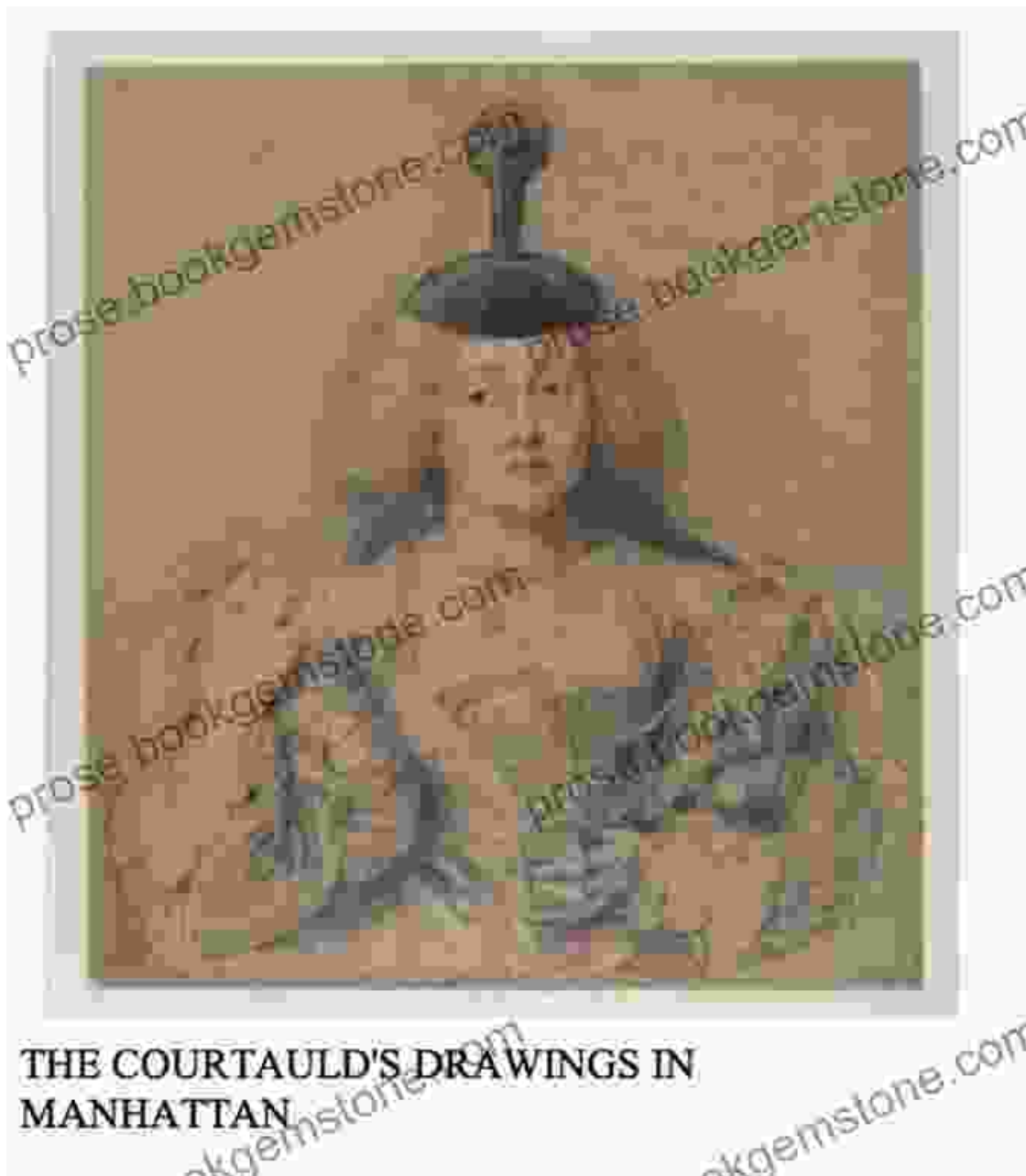
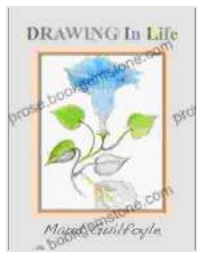


Drawing In Life: Maud Guilfoyle

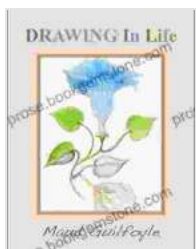
