
One Woman's Journey From Cubicle in Corporate America to the Depths of the Deep South



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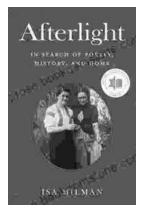
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
