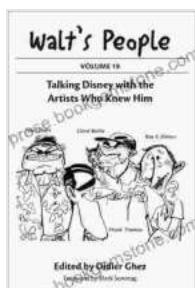

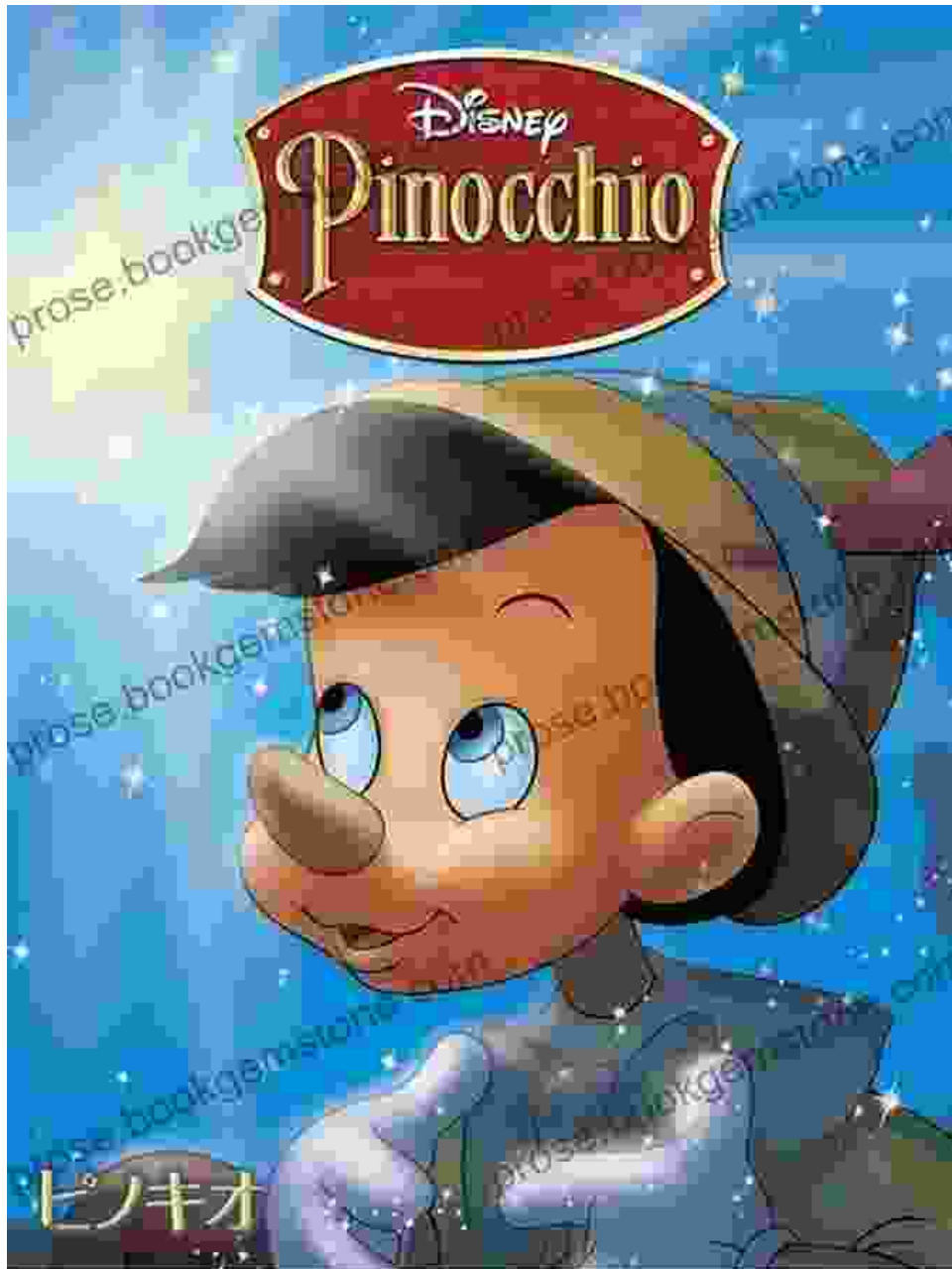

"Ursula was such a fun character to bring to life," Deja said. "She's over-the-top, dramatic, and deliciously evil." Deja described how he drew

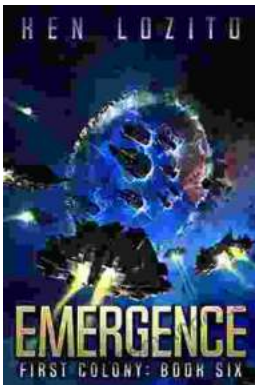
